A Heavenly Christmas

Were earth a thousand times as fair And set with gold and jewels rare, It would be far too poor and small A cradle for the Lord of all.

And so it pleases You to see This simple truth revealed to me: That worldly honor, wealth, and might Are weak and worthless in Your sight. (Martin Luther; LSB 358:10,12)



So you think heaven is beautiful, huh? The streets are paved with gold, set against the brilliant white of the clouds that hold the city. Just down the road sits a mansion that is your house, with a throne-like chair in front of your place at the banquet table. Your dinner plate is filled with the finest of delights, enough to make you content to the brim.

Well, I'd like to give you a different picture of heaven. This is taken from a Martin Luther Christmas sermon:

Joseph was of the lineage of David and had to go to Bethlehem, the city of David. Despite his royal ancestry, he was so poor that he had been unable to make a living in Judea and for that reason had transferred to Nazareth. Now he had to go back. Scripture says that he took with him "Mary his espoused wife, being great with child." She would have had good reason to excuse herself from making the journey so close to her time, but she said nothing because she wished to trouble no one. We can see how poor Joseph must have been that he could not afford to hire some old woman or neighbor to stay with Mary and look after her while he was gone.

How unobtrusively and simply do those events take place on earth that are so heralded in heaven! On earth it happened in this wise: There was a poor young wife, Mary of Nazareth, among the meanest dwellers of the town, so little esteemed that none noticed the great wonder that she carried. She was silent, did not vaunt herself, but served her husband, who had no man or maid. They simply left the house. Perhaps they had a donkey for Mary to ride upon, though the Gospels say nothing about it and we may well believe that she went on foot. Think how she was treated in the inns on the way, she who might well have been taken in a golden carriage, with gorgeous equipage! How many great ladies and their daughters there were at that time, living in luxury, while the mother of God, on foot, in midwinter trudged her weight across the fields! How unequal it all was! ...

Bad enough that a young bride married only a year could not have had her baby at Nazareth in her own house instead of making all that journey of three days when heavy with child. The inn was full. No one would release a room to this pregnant woman. She had to go to a cow stall and there bring forth the Maker of all creatures because nobody would give way.

"And so it was, that, while they were there, the days were accomplished that she would be delivered. And she brought forth her firstborn son, and wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger."

Heaven is where Jesus is. He is with you, in his promise of salvation. Remember that this Christmas.

The Zion Food Pantry began in a basement closet in the 70s to provide for the hungry and was supported exclusively by congregational volunteers. Due to its success, it outgrew the closet and eventually was moved into the west-facing garage by Zion's kitchen, where it operates today. Through the continued growth of the pantry over time, we have reached a point where the pantry space no longer accommodates its needs.

The church's good reputation quickly led to a significant response from the community, resulting in drastic constraints on space and budget. It eventually became impossible to provide food for so many without additional assistance. Zion's partnership with the Cleveland Food Bank ensured mercy would continue to reach outstretched hands. Zion abides by The Cleveland Food Bank's non-discrimination rule, which dictates that all pantries provide an atmosphere in which the guests never feel obligated to participate in any church activities to obtain food. We honor that policy, but make sure that any scripture related literature, books, non-food goods, or flyers advertising community and church activities are made available to the guests on separate tables on a strictly voluntary basis. If any guests ask for prayer for special needs, our volunteers accept their request and if asked, will pray for them privately outside the pantry guest area.

Today, space is so tight that traffic flow on Hayes Street cannot handle the food pantry line of cars. After registering, individuals and families wait in their cars in line before driving from the church parking lot onto Mentor Avenue then to Hayes Street and into the small driveway near the school playground, where the food is distributed.

Zion is blessed to provide this ministry to give food, support, and encouragement to the guests of the Food Pantry, responding to ever-growing needs reflected in recent data. One survey in 2023 found adults in 2 out of 3 households receiving aid from food banks were eating less at mealtimes or skipping meals altogether because there wasn't enough. 50% of these families had to choose between food and housing, 55% between food and healthcare or medicine, and 66% between food and utilities. As Christ desires, we are determined to respond to the 15% increase in demand for Zion's food pantry from 2022 to October 31, 2023.

Matthew 25:37-40 – "Then the righteous will answer him, saying, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? And when did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? And when did we see you sick or in prison and visit you?' And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me.'"

A Healing Space for At-Risk Children Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch, ND — \$100,000

The Christ-centered, healing ministry of Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch creates an eternal, life-giving impact in the lives of children, age 10 to 18, who have faced unimaginable trauma. Due to childhood traumas of violence, abuse, neglect, and more, Ranch children experience debilitating emptiness and loneliness at the deepest of levels; levels that only Christ can heal.

A specialized chapel has been designed to provide hope and healing for at-risk children, ages 10 to 18, in the care of the Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch, Bismarck, North Dakota, campus. Children at this facility have faced severe trauma in their lives, and need healing that only Jesus can give. This mission grant will help with building costs of the new chapel and provide spiritual care for these children, their families, and the Ranch staff. A construction date of Spring 2024 has been set to build a chapel to serve as a healing space to help them know and experience the mercy of Christ and His healing power. This grant will help meet the construction costs of the Chapel on the Bismarck campus and provide healing for at-risk children.

In response to the Great Commission as found in Matthew 28:19-20, "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."



"A Healing Space for At-Risk Children" fills a crucial gap in spiritual care on the Ranch's Bismarck campus with a new chapel specifically designed to be a healing space for traumatized boys and girls.



The mission of Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch is to help at-risk children and their families succeed in the name of Christ.

Thank you for your past support of The Hope Chest. It is a Lake County Mission organization that provides for the physical needs of many homeless and financially challenged. The Hope Chest partners with Jobs & Family Services, Project Hope, Salvation Army, Forbes House, Lifeline, YMCA, schools, pastors, and emergency sources. The Hope Chest is filled with donated clothes, shoes, school supplies, toys & games, towels, bedding, kitchen items, (cutlery, pots & pans) and even small household appliances that clients with a referral can 'shop' for 3-4 times a year. NO money is needed by the clients.

All these items are donated when someone cleans a closet, gets new, or doesn't need an item anymore. Currently, The Hope Chest is especially in need of girl's winter coats, thick gloves for all ages & sizes, men's shoes, 2-piece toothpaste holders, and winter clothes. Items can of course be new, but we accept "like" new from your closet or storage bins.

As you are decorating for Christmas celebrations & shopping for gift giving, consider setting aside items you no longer use or have outgrown, to make room for the new items you will be getting. Set your old items aside and bring to church in a bag marked for "HOPE CHEST."
